

Mid 18 th century	John Edwyn, builder of the current Hall, started to create a kitchen garden ¹					
By 1884	The WKG had two internal partitions so was subdivided into 3 sections with a central path down the full length.					
Between 1884 & 1903	The layout was simplified with one internal division and a central path.					
1939	There was a major sale at Baggrave Hall. The catalogue included the contents of the greenhouses and forcing pits.					
By 1959	Some walls (or possibly hedges) surrounding the WKG had been removed.					
Late 1980's	There was major rebuilding work. Existing brick walls, which surround the north-west section of the garden are believed to date from this time. The potting shed was partially rebuilt.					
Size of WKG and brief description	2.288 acres. A rectangle running north-west to south east, located at some distance to the south east of the Hall. Sloping quite steeply north-west to south-east then rising upwards again.

DESCRIPTION: CURRENT AND PAST					
It is still used partially as a kitchen garden and also as the private garden for Keeper's Cottage (formerly the Gardener's Cottage)					
Features: further information and current condition:					
Walls, doors, gates	One small curved section of wall remains – constructed from ironstone laid in a random pattern with rubble infill. It is topped with slate and blue brick coping. This would have formed the east corner of the first section of garden. Some of the boundaries may have been hedges, rather than walls.				
Glasshouses	None of the original glasshouses remain. The 1994 OS map shows a single long glasshouse running north-west to southeast. The 1903 map shows two glasshouses, in line, also running north-west to south-east.				
	In 1924 Thos. Messengers produced plans for a Carnation House, but this was not built by them. (However, a carnation house would appear to have been constructed, as the contents – all carnations – in Greenhouse 8 were listed in the 1939 sale.) The plans show the full range of the existing glasshouse as well the proposed addition. Their full length was 70 feet.				
	The 1939 sale catalogue lists 8 greenhouses, but some of these may have been sub-divisions of longer houses.				
	The 1959 OS map shows 3 areas of glass, but some of these may have been frames				
Frames	Unknown				
Pits	3 pits: bottom, middle and top pit listed in 1939 sale catalogue. No traces remain				
Hotwalls/furnaces	Unknown				
Heating pipes/boilers etc.	Unknown				
Backsheds, workrooms, stores	Potting shed remains, as shown in photo c.1925. Partially rebulate 1980's (new brickwork at front) in style of original which wa then described as a "Potting Shed". Style of original is early/mid 19 th century. It is located at the north corner of the WKG.				
Gardener's house, cottages, bothies	Original gardener's house remains – has been modernised. Shown in photo c.1925. It is on the slope, facing north-west and overlooking the garden.				
Wells, ponds, tanks, towers	Pond remains				
Planting	No original planting but sale catalogue lists contents of				

	glasshouses and pits.				
	A photo, c 1925 shows pelagoniums in a glasshouse.				
	In the existing garden, there is a row of Scots pines behind the Gardener's Cottage. These were in front of the south-east boundary and are shown on earlier maps.
