Size and brief	About 1 acre. The WKG at Nevill Holt is abutted by 2 further					
description:	walled gardens, one to the West and one to the South. On the					
	OS maps from 1886 and 1904 there is evidence of an orangery					
	in the garden to the South but apart from this it appears to have					
	been used as a pleasure garden. There is no evidence of how					
	the garden to the West was used. It currently houses an old					
	school building but it is being re-developed.					
	The orientation of the WKG is North/South but slightly inclined					
	towards the East. It has walls on all four sides and is situated within easy reach of the house. See Estate plan 1661. In 1886 there was a path on each side of the WKG running North					
	South. These paths were linked by 3 East West paths, one at					
	each end and one in the middle. The current paths follow the					
	same pattern.

DESCRIPTION: CURRENT AND PAST						
The evidence suggests that the main WKG at Nevill Holt has been in more-or-less continuous use as a WKG since before 1661. It is currently used to grow plants for a						
cut flower business. In addition soft fruit is grown and some vegetables.

Walls, doors, All the walls are mainly brick and of Flemish bond, with ran						
gates	burnt headers and in some places there is a stone plinth. The					
	exact composition and height of each wall varies. The land					
	slopes down slightly from West to East and this is reflected in the					
	walls. The main door to the WKG is at the southern end of the					
	East wall and opens on to the road.					
	There is a doorway on the eastern side of the South wall that					
	links the WKG with the walled garden to the South and one in the					
	centre of the West wall that opens into the walled garden to the					
	West					
Glasshouses	In 1886 there was a range of glasshouses along the North wall.					
	At the east end of this range there was a vinery. There was also a glasshouse, possibly an orangery on the north wall of the					
	walled garden to the South of the WKG.					
	In 1904 this 'orangery' extended the whole length of the north					
	wall and had a rectangular extension in the middle.					
	In 1929 The 'orangery' and the glass extension were not there.					
	The glasshouses on the north wall of the WKG were still standing					
	and there was also a range of lean-to glasshouses with span-					
	roofed plant-houses along the East wall.					
	Today there are still glasshouses in the WKG but they are new.					
	They were built in the early 21st C largely on the footprint of the					
	originals. In the vinery there is still a sunken path that would					
	have assisted the harvesting of the grapes towards the lower end of the roof.

Frames	There are now some frames in front of the glasshouse on the					
	East wall but there is no previous evidence of their existence.

Backsheds,	Since before 1886 there has been a row of 4 backsheds along

	In 1929 an open-fronted roofed storage area is shown adjacent					
	to the largest backshed. This is still in use today.					
	All the backsheds are brick built and have a single slate roof.					
	The larger one may have been used as a bothy.


